The final section lists opportunities available only to female applicants.

Many, but not all, of these opportunities require strong English skills. They generally require applicants to submit a body of work and curriculum vitae, and they all have application materials available online, with hyperlinks at the end of each opportunity’s description. BOND UNIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIPS

Bond University in the Gold Coast of Australia offers significant global scholarships available to highly qualified international students. Preference for these scholarships goes to applicants who perhaps may not be able to study at a tertiary level without substantial financial assistance.

BLAISE PASCAL INTERNATIONAL RESEARCH CHAIRS

The French Government and the Ile-de-France Region expects to award five Blaise Pascal International Research Chairs to highly qualified, foreign research scientists in any field, including humanities and social sciences. Each award allows the foreign scientist to be hosted for 12 months, possibly spread over 2 years, by one or more well-known Higher Learning or Research Institutions in Paris/Ile-de-France. The maximum funding for each project is up to 200 000 €, and includes salaries and accompanying expenses. Awardees will give about ten lectures and a public seminar while they reside in France. Female candidates are highly encouraged. Applications must be filled jointly by the host institution and the candidate for the Chair.

BRITISH CHEVENING SCHOLARSHIPS

These scholarships, funded by the Foreign and Commonwealth Office and administered by the British Council, are prestigious awards, which enable overseas students to study in the United Kingdom. Scholarships are offered in over 150 countries and enable talented graduates and young professionals to become familiar with the UK and gain skills, which will benefit their countries.

What are the selection criteria for application? A typical successful applicant would be:

- A graduate with proven academic skills.
- Committed to return to their country and contribute to the socio-economic development of their country through *implementing the new skills and knowledge acquired in the UK.
- Established in a career, with a track record of excellence and achievement, and the prospect of becoming a leader in his/her chosen field. The vast majority of Chevening scholars are aged 25 - 35 years old.
- Be able to show, through an interview, that they possess the personal qualities to benefit from their scholarship and use it to succeed in their chosen career.
- Have a clear idea how their scholarship will benefit their country on their return.

- Have good English Language skills, as most UK Higher Education Institutions require a minimum IELTS of 6.5 for admission onto Postgraduate courses.

The program does not support scholars in philology, the visual and performing arts, or business.

AFP accepts applications for fellowship placements in Albania, Armenia, Azerbaijan, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Bulgaria, Croatia, Georgia, Kazakhstan, Kosovo, Kyrgyzstan, Macedonia, Moldova, Mongolia, Montenegro, Romania, Russia, Serbia, Tajikistan, and Ukraine.

Fellowships generally include a stipend, transportation, and accommodation. Resident fellows also receive health insurance and various other allowances.

HUMAN RIGHTS ADVOCATES PROGRAM (HRAP), COLUMBIA UNIVERSITY

The Program is designed for lawyers, journalists, doctors, teachers, social workers, community organizers, and other human rights activists working with NGOs on issues including sexual and gender-based violence, domestic violence, minority rights, LGBT rights, labor rights, migration, health, social exclusion, environmental justice, and corporate social accountability.

Participants are selected on the basis of their previous work experience in human rights, commitment to the human rights field, and demonstrated ability to pursue graduate-level studies. Full-time students or government officials will not be considered.

Advocates must work at the grassroots level. Applicants from high-income countries will not be considered except for those representing marginalized communities. See the [FAQ at http://hrcolumbia.org/hrap/apply/faq/](#) for more information about this requirement. Fluency in English is required. Preference is given to those who have not previously had opportunities to travel and study internationally.

Advocates must provide proof of institutional endorsement from their organizations for their participation in the Program and must commit to returning to that organization upon completion of the Program. Only one application per organization should be submitted. More than one application means all applications from that organization will be disqualified.

This extremely competitive Program will admit approximately eight participants. HRAP makes every effort to provide full fellowships to cover program costs as well as travel and living expenses for selected Advocates each year.

HEWLETT/IIE DISSERTATION FELLOWSHIPS IN POPULATION, REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH, AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

The Institute of International Education (IIE) is now accepting applications for the Dissertation Fellowship in Population, Reproductive Health, and Economic Development. The two-year fellowships of up to \$15,000 per year will be awarded by The William and Flora Hewlett Foundation and IIE. The fellowships are open to students currently enrolled in Ph.D. programs in sub-Saharan Africa. Students in economics, economic demography, geography, and epidemiology are especially encouraged to apply.

These fellowships will support dissertation research on topics that examine how population dynamics and family planning and reproductive health (FP/RH) influence economic development, including economic growth, poverty reduction, and equity. Dissertations that address population and development issues pertinent to the African continent are especially encouraged. The research must include a strong quantitative component, with an emphasis on rigorous data analysis. We encourage the development or use of new statistical methods. Finally, the research must have a strong policy-relevant component, demonstrating an interest in communicating research results with program managers, planners, and policymakers.

The International Foundation for Science (IFS) provides support to young scientists of merit in developing countries by awarding research grants and providing grantees with additional services, such as travel grants and purchasing assistance.

The IFS supports research related to the renewable utilization of biological resources in areas such as crop and animal production, forestry, food science, natural products, and fisheries, as well as research on the sustainable utilization and conservation of natural ecosystems, including themes such as water and biodiversity. Proposals for projects may address biological, chemical, or physical processes as well as social and economic relationships important in the conservation, production, and renewable utilization of the biological resource base.

As well as being under the age of 40 (under 30 for applicants from China) and at the start of their research career, candidates must possess a higher academic degree, which should be at least an MSc or equivalent.

EDWARD R. MURROW JOURNALISM FELLOWS PROGRAM

The U.S. government and six universities are cooperating on a new program that will bring 100 journalists from around the world to the country for study and training.

Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice announced the launch of the Edward R. Murrow Journalism Fellows Program on December 13. The fellows will train for three weeks in April at their respective host universities, which will develop special curricula for the journalists.

According to the organizers, the journalists will travel to Washington, D.C. at the beginning of April for a short orientation and a chance to meet government officials. They will then break into six groups and travel to one of the participating universities.

At the university, they will attend specialized seminars, interact with American students, and learn about local government through visits to state capitals and small communities. The program concludes back in Washington with an international journalism symposium.

The program is a cooperative effort of the State Department's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs, the Colorado-based Aspen Institute, and the universities of Kentucky, Minnesota, North Carolina (Chapel Hill), Oklahoma, Southern California and Texas (Austin).
